compensate

(verb) To make up for; to pay in exchange for work. The movie started 30 minutes late, but the theater **compensated** for that by giving us all free popcorn.

Other forms: You deserve **compensation** (noun) for all the hard work you've been doing.

courteous

Considerate toward others; polite. Renald is the kind of **courteous** guy who always holds open the door.

Other forms: When the mayor visited our classroom, we showed him a lot of **courtesy** (noun).

dedicate

(verb) 1. To set aside for a certain purpose. My mom has **dedicated** her whole life to helping blind people lead normal lives. 2. To offer something (like a piece of music, an award, or a book) to a certain person or cause. I'd like to **dedicate** this next song to my cat, Mr. Snuggles. Other forms: The goalie played for two hours in the rain, which showed her amazing **dedication**

(noun) to the sport.

kin

(noun) A person's relatives. Jimmy, Joey, Johnny, Jeffy, Jenny, and I are all kin.

luxurious

(idj) Providing ease and comfort far beyond what is necessary. Once my album starts selling, I'm going to move out of this little house and into a *luxurious* mansion in Hollywood.

Other forms: To me it's just normal, but my grandfather thinks that TV is a **luxury** (noun).



luxurious

major

Great in size, number, or importance. The election of Barack Obama as the first African-American president of the United States was one of the most **major** events I've ever lived through. (noun) A rank in the military. Dennis saluted the **major** as she walked into the room.

minor



[adj] Small, unimportant. It's just a **minor** thing, but could you please stop tapping your foot? (noun) Someone who is not legally an adult. Because we are **minors**, we aren't allowed to vote yet.



obsolete

No longer in wide use because it is out of date. Some people think that CDs made cassette tapes and records **obsolete**.

pardon

(verb) To forgive. Please **pardon** me for being so late.

seldom

(adverb) Not often; rarely. Salvatore **<u>seldom</u>** plays sports; he prefers to read books instead.

Word Breakdown


